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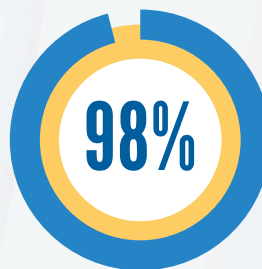

First Star provides high school youth in foster care with the opportunity, tools, and support to successfully transition to self-sufficiency through higher education or other viable pathways

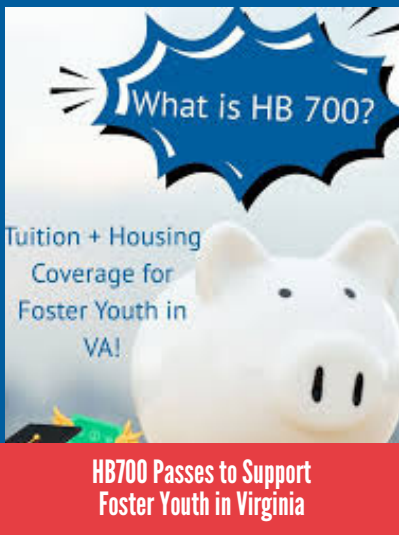

# THE ACADEMY MODEL

## ACADEMY PROGRAMMING INCLUDES THE FOLLOWING:



### MONTHLY ACADEMIES

Monthly programming over four years for youth in foster care focused on academics and life skills while they are in high school.

### SUMMER ACADEMY

Intensive 2-4 week residential enrichment program on a university campus.

### CAREGIVER ENGAGEMENT

Seminars and workshops that provide tools to caregivers to become advocates for their youth.

### VIRTUAL ENGAGEMENT

Weekly mentoring and tutoring sessions, as well as an open environment to connect and build community through virtual hangouts.



### STEAM ACADEMY

Virtual Tech Talks and access to labs that focus on Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math.



### SCHOLAR ADVISORY COMMITTEE (SAC)

Leadership opportunity for scholars focused on becoming civically engaged and enacting change in their local communities.



### ALUMNI PROGRAM

Offered to scholars who graduate the Academy as a resource during their transition to adulthood.

## CELEBRATING SCHOLAR SUCCESS



### FIRST STAR ALUMNI PROGRAM

The First Star Alumni Program's goal is to remain connected and ensure Alumni have access to resources and the First Star network as they transition into adulthood, career, and advanced education.



**100%** of the 2025 graduating class enrolled in the Alumni Program

**79%** of enrolled Alumni engage with the program via resources, newsletters and events

**22%** of peer mentors are First Star Alumni

### FIRST STAR STUDENT ADVISORY COMMITTEE (SAC)

First Star encourages advocacy and engagement in social justice through the Scholar Advisory Committee (SAC). SAC is composed of current scholars from across the First Star Academy network and from the Alumni Program. SAC allows scholars to build community, freely share their ideas and opinions, and dialogue about important issues!



**80%** of SAC scholars were returners from last year

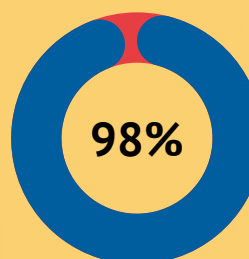

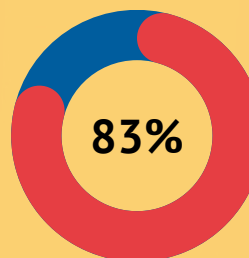

#### National Graduating Class



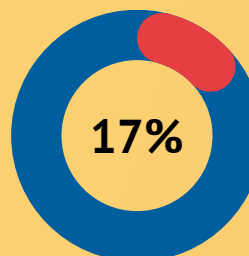

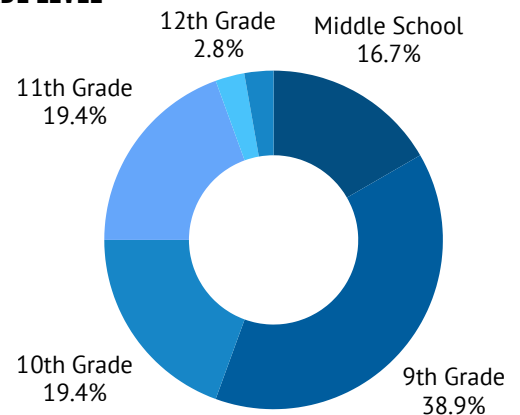

## 2024-2025 ACADEMIC YEAR

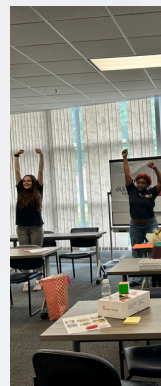


### LIFE SKILLS AND SELF DISCOVERY

Scholars engaged in a variety of hands-on learning and community service experiences throughout the program. They served lunch to students, staff, and community members as part of their commitment to giving back. Scholars also previewed The Game of ChaNJE, a financial literacy game created by a local tax advisor and business owner, gaining practical insights into money management. In partnership with Easter Seals, they participated in cooking and communication workshops, working in pairs to prepare stuffed peppers from scratch while building teamwork and life skills.

### HEALTH AND WELLBEING

This academic year emphasized mental health and well-being, beginning in September with Khayla Walker, who guided scholars on building and maintaining healthy relationships and setting boundaries within their friend groups and communities. Subsequent academies offered opportunities for yoga, guided and seated meditation, and recreational activities to support mindfulness and stress reduction. In May, Teens with a Purpose led scholars in self-expression through poetry, while the ODU Health Promotions department taught participants how to create portable aromatherapy capsules, calming bottles, and other relaxation tools to support daily wellness.



### CAREER EXPLORATION

The academic year began with Vision Driven 757, who introduced scholars to careers in real estate. In March, scholars enhanced their resumes and learned cooking skills, with one scholar securing part-time employment just two weeks later. In April, a local entrepreneur shared how she built Bruce Braids into a successful business, teaching scholars and interns braiding techniques and strategies for creating multiple streams of income.

### LEADERSHIP AND SELF ADVOCACY

Scholars showcased their creativity and skills through their culminating Photovoice IRB project, highlighting their unique perspectives and talents. They took an active leadership role in the Talent Show, assisting staff with planning and execution while representing the program to the audience. During the summer residential program, scholars also led the student awards ceremony, celebrating achievements and fostering a sense of ownership and community within the program.



### COLLEGE READINESS

Scholars participated in the Homecoming Parade, proudly representing the ODU First Star Academy—Go Monarchs! They received guidance from college students on preparing for higher education while still in high school. Additionally, scholars toured campus with the president of Foster-U and took part in a lunch-and-learn session with the Digital Builders, where they learned how to apply AI tools for academic and creative projects.

## BRIGHT FUTURES AHEAD

The National Bright Futures Survey was developed in partnership with Dr. Philip Hong from the University of Georgia to better understand our scholars' hopes and aspirations as it relates to their academic and future goals. In creating this survey and collecting feedback from scholars, we are embracing the challenge young people face and how we can be better stewards of their emotions and feelings as we support their growth in our Academies!

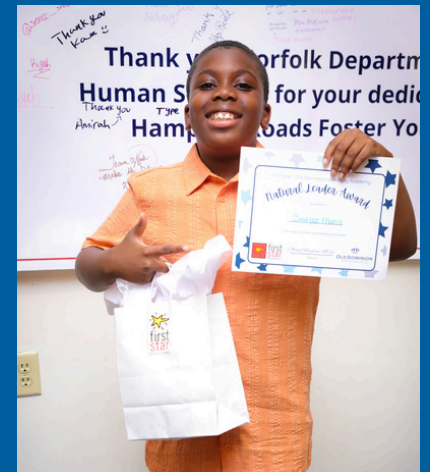

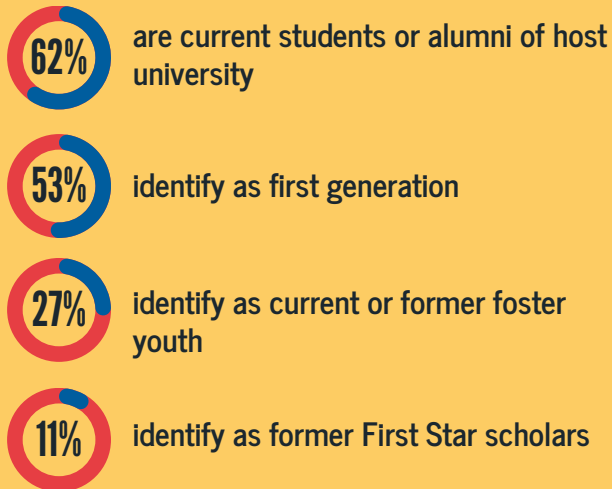
